Before you use the words below, take a few deep breaths and as you breathe in simply say 'Emmanuel – God with us' quietly to yourself a few times and take a moment to centre and focus on Jesus our Saviour.

When you are ready use the words below to lead yourself in prayer, take your time, pause and reflect as you go and note down anything that your feel God maybe saying to you.

May God turn his face towards you, may he bless you and may you feel his presence close to you.

Becoming Present to God

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

Our ever-present God, in this place and at this time, come to us.

A short moment of silence.

O come, thou dayspring, come and cheer our spirits by thine advent here.

(from O Come, O Come Immanuel)

Celebrating the Presence of God

Generous God, we come to you, the God who comes to us. We give you praise that you came in creation, founding the world and fashioning human beings in your likeness;

calling a people into being and walking alongside them come what may.

You came in Jesus Christ in self-giving love and in resurrection life. You came by your Spirit, making disciples drunk with grace.

And you have come to us, through friend and stranger, in joy and pain, opening our eyes to the reality of Christ and playing in ten thousand places.

Help us to celebrate your presence as we seek to make known your love to the world, and as we look with hope to the new creation which will break in when you come again. In Christ's name we pray. Amen.
